Comment [WCA4]: A column spanner is a heading that identifies the entries in two or more columns in the body of the table

Comment [WCA5]: A stub head is a heading that identifies the entries in the leftmost column

Comment [WCA6]: A table spanner is a heading that covers the entire width of the body of the table, allowing for further divisions

Comment [WCA7]: A cell is a point of intersection between a row and a column

Comment [WCA8]: Table spanner

Comment [WCA9]: A cell is a point of intersection between a row and a column

Comment [WCA10]: This table body consists of rows of cells containing primary data of the table.

Comment [WCA11]: Three types of notes can be placed below the table
